# A MESSAGE FROM OUR FOUNDER

As I reflect on 2024–2025, I am struck by both the successes and challenges that define our work. At the heart of this journey lies a simple truth: conservation is the ‘wisdom of love in action’. It is through this strength of love that our actions will preserve a future for animal species, forests, and communities.

## Rising to the Challenge

Nowhere is the struggle clearer than in Borneo, where coal mining expansion has driven a surge in orangutan rescues. Each rescue is a story of survival and a stark reminder of pressure on their forest home. These hardships weigh on us, yet also strengthen our resolve.

Progress continues. In the Busang–Wehea Ecosystem, we are securing habitat and expanding orangutan releases. In the Sumatran Leuser Ecosystem, we are advancing land buybacks along the Singkil River and nearing protection of vast rainforest in the north-east to restore habitat for *Critically Endangered* orangutans, elephants and tigers.

## The Impact You Make Possible

In 2024–2025, your generosity fueled an additional USD \$4.2 million for conservation, bringing our total since 1998 to USD \$43 million—a testament to compassion in action.

Because of you, together we are:

- Securing and restoring vital habitat for orangutans, elephants, and tigers.
- Rescuing, rehabilitating, and releasing orangutans.
- Reducing elephant–human conflict and supporting sustainable livelihoods.
- Safeguarding tigers through habitat protection and anti-poaching patrols.
- Empowering forest communities, with stronger women’s leadership, better education, and sustainable pathways.

These outcomes affirm that conservation protects both wildlife and human dignity.

## A Vision That Endures

The road ahead remains steep. Forces of extraction press hard, yet each acre of forest protected, each orangutan released, each child educated is a seed of renewal. Together, these grow into a vision of coexistence where wildlife and people thrive.

# OUR STRATEGY

Our approach to conservation supports a wide range of critical projects that address the holistic problem facing *Critically Endangered* orangutans, Asian elephants and tigers, and forest communities - including fighting deforestation and habitat loss at the highest levels.

## 1. Legally Protect Forest

- Legally change the legal status of high conservation value forests to protect wild orangutans, elephants and tigers and introduced populations of ex-captive orangutans.
- Support legal cases
- Scientific advice
- Forest community representation

## 2. Secure, Restore and Patrol Habitat

- Purchase, lease and manage land to secure viable ecosystems of the right type, shape and size.
- Restore degraded forest fragments adjacent to intact areas.
- Resource Wildlife Protection Units to patrol the habitat.

## 3. Rescue, Rehabilitate and Release Orangutans, Elephants and Tigers

- Rescue, rehabilitate and release, ex-captive and displaced orangutans into protected habitat.
- Treat and release injured and sick elephants and tigers.

## 4. Educate and Empower Forest Communities

- Through community engagement, education and support, empower forest communities to help restore and become guardians of natural forests within our targeted ecosystems.

## SECURING FORESTS AND RESTORING HOPE: FROM SUMATRA TO SRI LANKA

Thanks to your extraordinary generosity, we are protecting some of the world's most threatened habitats - safeguarding strongholds for orangutans, elephants, tigers and countless other species.

In **Sumatra's Singkil peat swamps**, our campaign to secure 11,164 acres is gaining momentum. With your support, 1,297 acres have already been purchased, creating a protective buffer around the Rawa Singkil Wildlife Reserve - one of the world's most critical strongholds for biodiversity and climate resilience. Restoration through community nurseries is reviving degraded land and providing farmers with sustainable livelihoods. Each acre saved is both a refuge for wildlife and an investment in people and our planet's future.

In **Sri Lanka's Wasgamuwa** region, your support is turning conflict into coexistence. Deforestation has forced elephants into farmland, intensifying clashes with communities. Through our partnerships in Sri Lanka, we have identified key lands to create a buffer zone and ecological corridor linking Wasgamuwa National Park, the Weheragala-Himbiliyakade Forest Reserve, and the Knuckles Mountain Range. Negotiations with landowners are underway to secure these areas - bringing us closer to providing a safe passage for elephants and harmony between people and wildlife.

**Together, these efforts are lifelines. Because of you, forests are safeguarded, elephants and orangutans are finding refuge, and communities are building futures alongside thriving wildlife.**

Thanks to you, degraded land along the Singkil River is being reclaimed and restored into a thriving forest - protecting one of the last strongholds of Sumatran orangutans.

## A NEW CHAPTER FOR ORANGUTANS AT BORA

Your incredible generosity helped us to achieve two major milestones in our mission to protect *Critically Endangered* Bornean orangutans. Our Bornean Orangutan Rescue Alliance (BORA) rescue and rehabilitation centre has grown to include a purpose-built Baby House, as well as expanded grounds for Jungle School and a dedicated sanctuary. Together, these new spaces mark a transformative step in giving orphaned and displaced orangutans the safety, care, and second chance at life they deserve.

### The Baby House: A Safe Haven for the Tiniest Rescues

Our brand-new Baby House is a safe and nurturing sanctuary designed specifically for the youngest orangutans in our care. This purpose-built haven provides everything they need to thrive: climbing structures to build strength and confidence, nesting pods for rest, and play areas to encourage natural behaviours essential for survival. It also offers shelter during harsh weather, enabling caregivers to provide dedicated care while fostering independence and resilience.

### Centre Expansion: Growing Space, Growing Hope

To meet the rising need for rehabilitation, BORA has expanded onto six new adjoining land plots, adding 6.9 acres of precious space. This land will be used for Jungle School - where young orangutans learn the skills they'll need to return to the wild - and to create a permanent rainforest sanctuary. This sanctuary will provide a lifelong home for orangutans who cannot be released but who will play a vital role in a managed breeding program to safeguard the future of their species.

## SAFEGUARDING ELEPHANTS OF WAY KAMBAS

Thanks to you, the Way Kambas River Patrol Unit plays a frontline role in safeguarding the *Critically Endangered* Sumatran elephant in Way Kambas National Park, South Sumatra.

Over the past year, patrol teams have dismantled more than 65 snares - including an 8-kilometre electric trip-wire - disrupted poaching attempts, and helped extinguish fires across 5,800 hectares of forest. Their vigilant presence protects elephants - and other wildlife - from harm.

Yet protection goes beyond patrols. The team works hand in hand with local communities, supporting farmers in safeguarding their crops, reducing human-wildlife conflict, and nurturing long-term trust.

The Unit also provides vital support to the National Park authority by monitoring wild elephant herds, assisting with DNA sampling, and recording wildlife sightings - work that helps showcase and safeguard the rich biodiversity of this fragile ecosystem.

None of this would be possible without your generosity. Your support empowers the River Patrol Unit to protect elephants, preserve forests, and strengthen bonds with local communities. Together, we are securing a future where people and wildlife thrive side by side.

## WATCHING OVER THE LAST TIGERS OF BUKIT TIGAPULUH

Thanks to your support, the Wildlife Protection Unit (WPU) has completed the most extensive trail camera survey in Bukit Tigapuluh, one of the last strongholds for the *Critically Endangered* Sumatran tiger. With fewer than 300 left in the wild, every individual matters.

The survey identified seven tigers, including males and females never before recorded. Each was catalogued by its unique stripe pattern, adding vital evidence to the national database and guiding protection strategies. Trail cameras do more than capture images – they provide proof of tiger presence and data essential for survival.

The survey also revealed Bukit Tigapuluh's extraordinary biodiversity, documenting over 30 species from elephants and sun bears to key prey animals like muntjac and wild boar - clear signs of a thriving ecosystem. At the same time, threats such as poachers, snares, and illegal logging were exposed, prompting immediate ranger action to dismantle traps, report activity, and strengthen patrols.

Your commitment is safeguarding this landscape as a vital sanctuary for tigers and other wildlife - ensuring these magnificent cats have a future for generations to come.

## CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF CONSERVATION LEADERSHIP

This year we celebrate a powerful milestone - 20 years of the Orangutan Caring Scholarship (OCS) Program. Run by our Advisory Board Member Dr Gary Shapiro and universities and local organisations across Indonesia, the program has awarded more than 300 scholarships since 2006. Today, over 200 graduates are serving as teachers, veterinarians, researchers, and conservationists - shaping a brighter future for Indonesia's people, forests, and wildlife.

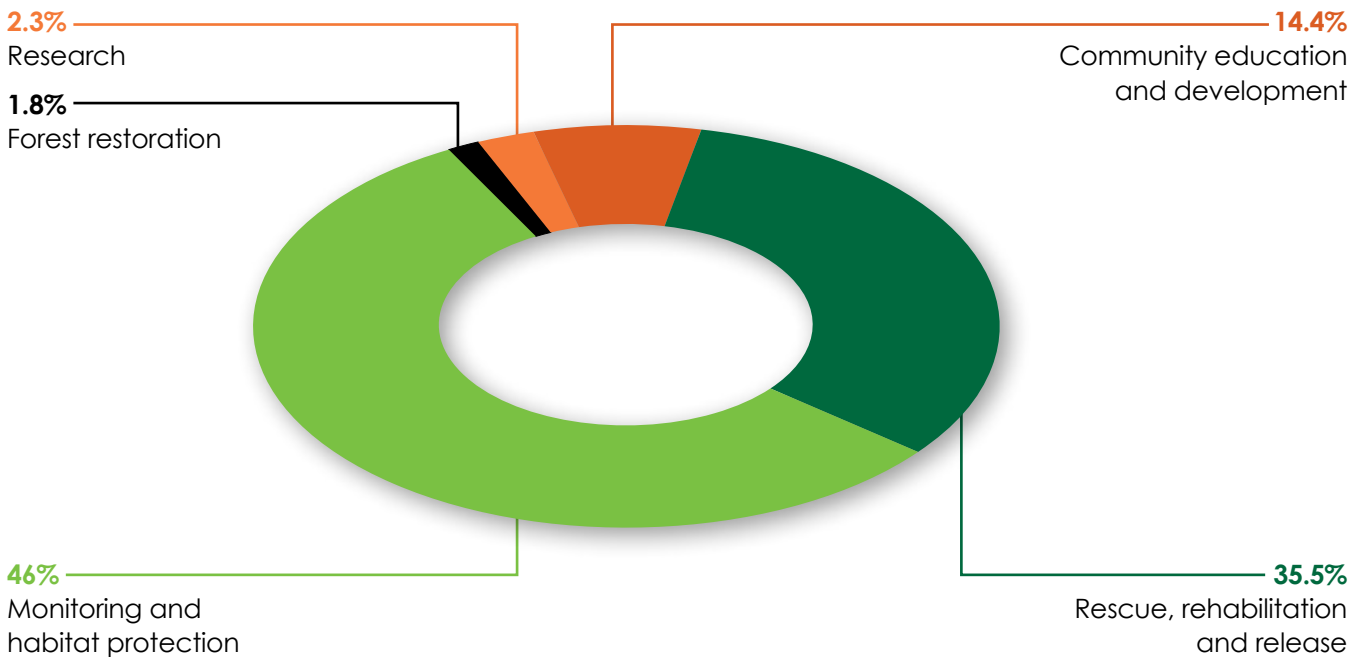
Take the story of Darsimah Siahaan. Growing up near Sumatra's forests, she dreamed of studying biology but had no way to pursue her education. In 2013, thanks to an OCS scholarship funded by supporters like you, her life changed. She began planting seedlings, monitoring wildlife, and gaining skills that launched her conservation career. Today, she manages the very program that once lifted her up and has founded the Leuser Nature School, where children are learning to treasure their forests as part of their heritage. Because of her leadership, her community - once dependent on logging and hunting - is now turning toward sustainable livelihoods.

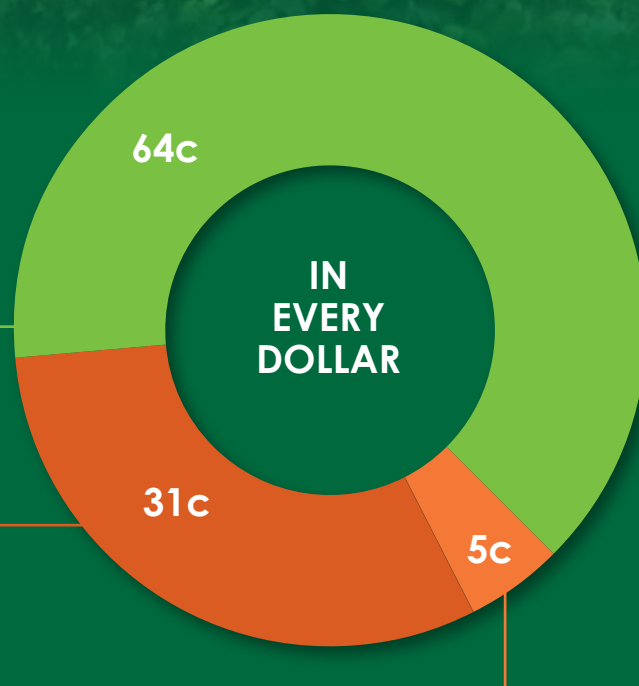
